


Strategy #37

- Circular response: everyone sits in a circle, and each learner takes a turn responding to a question or prompt, first summarizing the preceding speaker's comments and using that as a start for their own comments (Barkley, 2010)
- Prompt: What do you think is the best reason to engage students in their own learning?
